been everything from Posts surrendering their charters to preparing for this year's State Convention. It has been an interesting experience and I am looking forward to the future challenges of the Department.



To better prepare the membership, I would recommend a continued, strong presentation by the Department Officers at District meetings to provide training and bring information pertaining to our mission. Additionally, the Department representative should bring back any issues to the State Commander and Line Officers for resolution. Further, we must encourage those Posts that have not attended OTI in a couple of years to attend as the By-Laws change every year and they can contact those who could be a resource in the future. I suggested that the District Commanders continue share their OTI dates so that each could maximize the effect of the training.

Simply stated, the Department Line Officers and Membership Team need to be more visible at the Post, County Council, and District meetings.

Reminder: VFW Posts may change their Quartermasters this year and the IRS requires that the all new Quartermasters file IRS Form 8822-B within 60 days of taking office. This form provides the Quartermaster's current contact information and current address in the event that the IRS send notifications and/or contact the Quartermaster. There is a link on the Department website to down load the IRS Form 8822-B.

As we move into a new year and have a whole new slate of officers, let's not forget that it is a TEAM effort that makes us successful so don't hesitate to get everyone in your post involved in order to make 2019-2020 another banner year.

As I mentioned in the last newsletter the Department Officers and the Legislative Team attended the Washington Conference. Our VOD winner received \$2,000 and in addition, the Legislative Conference was capped by VFW C.I.C BJ Lawrence's speech in front of House and Senate lawmakers. He focused on the Blue Water Veterans and shared his disappointment with Congress for failing to restore benefits earned by these Vietnam War sailors, and urged them to pass the Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act to ensure their earned benefits are never arbitrarily stripped away again. The Chief also covered the newly passed VA Mission Act. To view the Chief's full speech visit https://vfw.org/legislativeconference

Members now have the ability to download their digital version of their membership card. This will not replace the physical VFW membership card as they will still be sent out in the mail. You can go on the National Website and follow the directions for downloading your VFW card.

There are also many training tools online. You can find Member and Officer Training, Forms and Templates, training material relating to Membership Recruiting and Retention, Community Service and Youth Programs, Communications and Public Affairs, Post Service Officer Training, etc. Commanders, use these valuable tools and training guides in your posts. Pick one out and use it at a Post Meeting, your members will thank you for it.

On another note, the VA has just implemented a new Appeals Modernization System, that will speed up the appeal process, you will be hearing more about this at the OTIs next year. If you have an appeal pending it will still be adjudicated under the old system; if you are going to start a new appeal make sure you talk to an accredited service officer.


Comrades,

Miracle Workers

Veterans share a common bond of service and often a common desire to help fellow veterans in need. All of us are familiar with the "Big Six" National Veteran's Service Organizations who provide a wide array of services for our nation's finest from legislative advocacy and victories, to local educational and community improvement efforts. Most of us are also familiar with a few local not-for-profit organizations that assist veterans as well. These groups can vary widely in their focus, scope, size and effectiveness. Nonetheless, they can be extremely helpful and pair well with the VFW's Service mission for veterans. As VFW members, we should be familiar with the grassroots work being done within our communities so that we can share and collaborate to bring optimum results for those that need us.

Our Albany and New York City Department Service Office work alongside some of these organizations in order to identify, locate, and assist veterans and their families. In many cases, there is an immediate need for necessities that larger private and government organizations are not capable of responding to in time. Legal constraints, logistical challenges and funding rules often restrict larger entities from moving quickly; simply, a hare is faster than a hippo! Local non-profits generally have a small but strong network of people willing to help quickly. I remain amazed at how many veterans these groups bring to us, many of them unaware, in need, and eligible for VA benefits! Our relationships with local efforts is mutually beneficial; our Service Office will often identify needs that these partners can fulfill through a wide variety of resources and contacts. The partnership is always beneficial to the veteran as the 'All Hands' approach consistently yields the best results!

Once you plug into the entire scope of Veteran's Service and Support resources, you will be surprised at just how many and how much is out there. The network of State, County, Municipal, private and even individual organizations is overwhelming. This realization leads one to ask: "Then why do veterans remain unassisted?" The answer is complex. First, the demand overwhelms the available workforce. We have been continually engaged in multiple conflicts for almost 20 years. Second, of all the available services very few are sharply focused and able to respond quickly. There are food pantries that are only manned part-time; clothing centers require intake sessions and registration, and Veterans Homes that demand extensive background checks and referrals. Often, there is no one at hand who can readily fix a crisis. Lastly, funding is often misfocused. Many donate to causes that make them feel good such as a cute furry service dog perhaps instead of a load of groceries. In light of these realities, know that there are still groups out there that work diligently to fix immediate problems with what I call the "Three T's" (Time, Talent and Trade). All of us know a

"Firefighter Slutman bravely wore two uniforms and committed his life to public service both as a New York City Firefighter and as a member of the United States Marine Corps," said Commissioner Nigro. "The hearts and prayers of the entire Department are with his loved ones and with the families of his fellow service members who lost their lives in service to our nation."

Firefighter Slutman was appointed Firefighter in September of 2003 and assigned to Ladder Company 17 in the South Bronx. In 2015 he transferred to Ladder Company 27, located in the Claremont section of the Bronx. In 2014, he was honored for bravery after rescuing an unconscious woman at a fire in the South Bronx.

Firefighter Slutman is the 1,152nd member of the Department to make the Supreme Sacrifice in the line-of-duty.

Firefighter Slutman is the fourth FDNY member to die while serving in Iraq and Afghanistan since U.S. military action commenced in 2003.

Firefighter Slutman is survived by his wife, Shannon, and their three young daughters.

Three Tips to Help You File a More Complete Form 990-Series Return

A tax-exempt organization using the calendar-year as its tax year must file a Form 990-series return by May 15th, unless it has filed Form 8868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time To File an Exempt Organization Return. The IRS suggests organizations consider these three tips to help ensure a complete return and reduce the chances we'll send your return back or need to request additional information:

Issue 1: Report your organization's correct organization type. Many organizations report the incorrect organization type in Part I of <u>Schedule A</u>, Public Charity Status and Public Support, which all 501(c)(3) organizations must file with Form 990 or 990-EZ.

Solution: Look at the letter we sent your organization recognizing you as exempt (your "determination" letter) to verify your correct organizational type.

Issue 2: Employment taxes. Many organizations forget to file required employment tax returns, such as Forms W-2, 940, 941 or 945. **Solution:** Learn about employment tax filing requirements for exempt organizations. The <u>Employment Issues Course</u> explains how to report employee wages, payments to independent contractors and other reportable payments.

Issue 3: Missing attachments and schedules: Organizations often forget to attach the schedules that may be required of Form 990 or Form 990-EZ filers.

Solution: Carefully review Form 990 - Part IV, Checklist of Required

Schedules, or Form 990-EZ – Part V, Other Information, and Part VI, Section 501(c)(3) Organizations Only, to ensure that your organization has completed and attached all required schedules.

The <u>Form 990 Overview Course</u> discusses which forms to file, when they are due, public disclosure of your return and tips to help prepare your Form 990-series return.

Electronic filing can help you file a complete returnElectronic filing provides you with fast acknowledgement that the IRS has received your return. It also reduces normal processing time, making compliance with reporting and disclosure requirements easier. To ensure you are ready to file electronically, check your Electronic Filing Identification Number (EFIN) to ensure it is active.

In August 2018, EFINs were deactivated (dropped) if the system showed no usage for two years. For some filers, the system erroneously deactivated the account if the only returns filed using the EFIN were Form 990 series returns. Log into your existing IRS <u>e-File application</u> to check your EFIN status. If the status is not listed as "Active," you will need to reapply for a new EFIN by choosing the "Reapply" link on the "Application Details" page. If you encounter any problems when reapplying, you may contact the e-help Desk at 1-866-255-0654.

District 7 Frederick Totten Post 5005 Geneseo Honors Civil War Veterans

On April 25th, 2019 Geneseo Post 5005 held a dedication ceremony at the Civil War Monument in front of St. Mary's Church in Geneseo, New York. The ceremony was to add thirty (30) names of local Civil War veterans to the five (5) names that were originally inscribed on the approximately two and a half story monument in 1916. The project spearheaded by Post 5005 Quartermaster Richard Platt began in 2017 when a family friend of the Platt family who had previously moved to Kalamazoo, Michigan, sent him a package containing the "mustering out roster" for Company "E, 33rd Regiment, New York Volunteers. She had come across the document while cleaning out a building she planned to open a business in. The second name on the list was Moses B. Church who was the first man to be killed in action from Geneseo. While on picket line guard duty, Moses engaged a small Confederate unit with his pistol and was shot in the head. When Richard checked to see if Moses's name was on the existing list inscribed on the monument, he found that it wasn't. Thus began approximately seven months of research and "digging" into old records. After checking with the Livingston County Historian, the Temple Hill Cemetery, the Census Bureau,

the book **"Path of Blood"** written about the 33rd Regiment by John Contant in 1996 and <u>ancestory.com</u>, he came up with the additional thirty (30) names. Included in the list of names was that of General Wadsworth who was from the area and who was killed in action in the "Battle of the Wilderness" when his unit was outflanked by Confederate troops. Of the thirty-five names on the plaque, six were killed in action, seven died of their wounds and twenty-two died from disease (mostly chronic diarrhea).

Once Richard was satisfied he had an accurate, complete list, he went to his Post and with the help of the local American Legion Post they raised \$5,000.00 to update the plaque to include all thirty-five (35) names. It took approximately a year and a half to get the new plaque and it was dedicated with military honors to include a color guard and rifle squad. There were roughly seventy (70) guests in attendance to include local residents and members of Post 5005 and the American Legion Post.

Company "E" participated in five (5) major battles and was decommissioned in June of 1863.

District 7 Warsaw Memorial Post No. 4823 Celebrates Fifty Years

On March 22nd, 1969 the District 7 Warsaw Memorial Post 4823 was "mustered". The Korean and Vietnam wars veteran who worked to create the Post and become its first Commander was Gerald NEELEY. He, his brother Richard NEELEY, and Francis HEAD who were both Korean war veterans along with about seventeen (17) others, mostly Vietnam veterans, were the original charter members. From March 1969 until March 1985 the Post met at the Warsaw Park Memorial Building. From March 1985 until the present Post 4823 has been meeting in the Wyoming County Veterans Club located in Warsaw. The Post has been "saving up" to build their own Post home at some future date. From its beginning in 1969 until the present, Post 4823 has grown from its original twenty (20) members to its current strength of eighty (80) members with the greater majority being Life

Members. The Post recognized two of its original charter members at their Post celebration. The Post has been honored by receiving an 11" x 14" Citation of Appreciation from National Commander-in-Chief Vincent B.J. Lawrence. The citation states in part "The members of VFW Post 4823 are a pillar of support for Warsaw, New York. Year after year, you have provided superb public service to those who have borne the battle, as well as to their families, and you advance the health and well-being of those who bear the burden of defending our nation and our way of life." The Citation is to be presented to the Post 4823 Commander Gary Gardner at the upcoming District 7 Convention. Post 4823 has continually set the standard for District 7 and has been awarded "District 7 Post of the Year" on several occasions in addition to being an All-State Post for several years.
