Bernard L. (Ben) Thompson was born and raised in Jamaica, New York. He currently resides in St. Albans, New York. After graduating from high school, Ben chose to serve his country by enlisting in the United States Air Force. He served one tour of duty in the Republic of Vietnam with the 559th Tactical Fighter Squadron as a Weapons Specialist / Heavy Ordinance. Upon his return from overseas, Ben received a medical discharge.

In 1980, Ben, also known as "BIG Ben", joined the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States at Proctor-Hopson Post #1896 located in Jamaica, New York.
